TROPARION, KONTAKION & PROKEIMENON

<u>Troparion – Tone 6</u>

The Angelic <u>Pow</u>ers were at Thy tomb; the guards became as <u>dead</u> men. Mary <u>stood</u> by Thy grave, seeking Thy most pure <u>body</u>. Thou didst capture hell not being <u>tempt</u>ed by it. Thou didst come to the Virgin, <u>grant</u>ing life. O Lord, Who didst <u>rise</u> from the dead, <u>// glory</u> to Thee.

Troparion – Tone 4

Today the Church of Russia forms a <u>chor</u>us in joy, praising her new martyrs and con<u>fes</u>sors; hierarchs and priests, royal passion-bearers, right-believing princes and <u>prin</u>cesses, venerable men and women, and all Orthodox <u>Christ</u>ians. Having laid down their life for faith in Christ during the days of godless perse<u>cut</u>ion, they preserved the truth by the <u>shed</u>ding of blood.// By their protection, O long-suffering Lord, preserve our land in Orthodoxy till the <u>end</u> of the age.

Kontakion - Tone 6

When Christ God, the <u>Giv</u>er of Life, raised all of the dead from the valleys of misery with His <u>might</u>y hand, He bestowed resurrection on the <u>human race.</u>// He is the Savior of all, the Resurrection, the Life, and the <u>God</u> of all.

<u>Kontakion – Tone 3</u>

Today the new <u>mar</u>tyrs of Rus' stand in white robes before the <u>Lamb</u> of God, and with the angels they sing to God the hymn of <u>vic</u>tory: "Blessing, and glory, and wisdom, and praise, and <u>hon</u>or, and power, and <u>strength</u> be to our God// unto the <u>ages</u> of <u>ages</u>. Amen."

O Lord, save Thy people, / and bless Thine inheritance! V. To Thee, O Lord, will I call. O my God, be not silent to me!

Prokeimenon - Tone 7

God is our refuge and strength, / a help in afflictions that severely befall us.

LITURGICAL COMMEMORATION

New Martyrs and Confessors of Russia

On the Sunday closest to January 25, the Church commemorates the Synaxis of the Holy New Martyrs and Confessors of Russia, remembering all those Orthodox Christians who suffered for Christ at the hands of the godless Soviets during the years of persecution. These include the royal Passion Bearers Tsar Nicholas II and his family, and the Grand Duchess Elizabeth. Countless thousands of martyrs, both clergy and laity also suffered, some of whose names are known, as well as millions of simple believers whose names have been lost to history.

It is estimated that the number of the New Martyrs of Russia, who were glorified by the Russian Orthodox Church at the Jubilee Council of 2000, far exceeds that of all the martyrs who died for Christ during the first three centuries of Christianity. The Russian Church lost millions of its sons and daughters, not only at the hands of external enemies, but also those of their own country. Among those who were murdered and tortured in the years of persecution were countless Orthodox: laity, monks, priests, and bishops, whose only "crime" was their unshakable faith in God.

In the long history of the world, never have so many new heavenly intercessors been glorified by the Church in such a way (more than one thousand New Martyrs were numbered among the saints). Among those who suffered for their faith were some who labored in America before the Russian Revolution: St. Tikhon, Patriarch of Moscow and All Russia (April 7); St. Alexander Hotovitzky (Dec. 4); St. John Kochurov (Oct. 31).

Venerable Xenophon, his wife Maria, and their two sons Arcadius and John of Constantinople

Saint Xenophon, his wife Maria, and their sons Arcadius and John, were noted citizens of Constantinople and lived in the fifth century. Despite their riches and position, they distinguished themselves by their simplicity of soul and goodness of heart. Wishing to give their sons John and Arcadius a more complete education, they sent them off to the Phoenician city of Beirut.

By divine Providence the ship on which both brothers sailed was wrecked. The waves tossed the brothers ashore at different places. Grieved at being separated, the brothers dedicated themselves to God and became monks. For a long time the parents had no news of their children and presumed them to be dead.

Xenophon, however, already quite old, maintained a firm hope in the Lord and consoled his wife Maria, telling her not to be sad, but to believe that the Lord watched over their children. After several years the couple made a pilgrimage to the holy places, and at Jerusalem they met their sons, living in asceticsm at different monasteries. The joyful parents gave thanks to the Lord for reuniting the family.

Saints Xenophon and Maria went to separate monasteries and dedicated themselves to God. The monks Arcadius and John, having taken leave of their parents, went out into the wilderness, where after long ascetic toil they were glorified by gifts of wonderworking and discernment. Saints Xenophon and Maria, laboring in silence and strict fasting, also received from God the gift of wonderworking.

EPISTLE & GOSPEL READINGS

Epistle: 1 Timothy 1:15-17

This is a faithful saying and worthy of all acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am chief. However, for this reason I obtained mercy, that in me first, Jesus Christ might show all longsuffering, as a pattern to those who are going to believe on Him for everlasting life. Now to the King eternal, immortal, invisible, to God who alone is wise, be honor and glory forever and ever. Amen.

Gospel: Matthew 15:21-28

Then Jesus went out from there and departed to the region of Tyre and Sidon. And behold, a woman of Canaan came from that region and cried out to Him, saying, "Have mercy on me, O Lord, Son of David! My daughter is severely demonpossessed." But He answered her not a word. And His disciples came and urged Him, saying, "Send her away, for she cries out after us." But He answered and said, "I was not sent except to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." Then she came and worshiped Him, saying, "Lord, help me!" But He answered and said, "It is not good to take the children's bread and throw it to the little dogs." And she said, "Yes, Lord, yet even the little dogs eat the crumbs which fall from their masters' table." Then Jesus answered and said to her, "O woman, great is your faith! Let it be to you as you desire." And her daughter was healed from that very hour.

ORTHODOXY 101

Proskomedia

Before every Divine Liturgy, the priest prepares gifts of bread and wine to be used during the Eucharist. The preparation ritual is called the Liturgy of Preparation, or proskomedia. The meaning in Greek is "offering", indicating that it is our offering to God. God has blessed us with wheat and grapes, and we transform it into bread and wine, offering it back to God in thanksgiving. God then consecrates the bread and wine during the Divine Liturgy, returning it to us transformed. The bread that is offered in the Eucharist is called prosphora... It has a square seal on the top with the Greek letters IC XC (an abbreviation in Greek for Jesus Christ) and NIKA (meaning "conquers"). During the proskomedia, a portion of the loaf is cut out into a cube, and it is this inner part of the loaf, called the lamb, that is consecrated during the Divine Liturgy and, together with the red wine, will become the Body and Blood of Christ.



The Liturgy of Preparation includes blessing the prosphoron, cutting it on four sides to form a cube, piercing it with a spear, and reciting two verses from St. John's Gospel (John 19:34-35). The wine is mixed with water in a chalice and blessed by the priest. The priest then cuts triangular particles from a second prosphoron in commemoration of the Theotokos, from a third prosphoron to commemorate the ranks of saints, from a fourth prosphoron for the living, and from a fifth prosphoron for the departed.
