TROPARION, KONTAKION & PROKEIMENON

Troparion – Tone 2

When <u>Thou</u> didst descend to death, O Life im<u>mor</u>tal, Thou didst slay hell with the splendor of Thy <u>God</u>head. And <u>when</u> from the depths Thou didst <u>raise</u> the dead, all the powers of <u>heav</u>en cried out:// "O Giver of life, Christ our <u>God</u>, <u>glory</u> to Thee!"

LITURGICAL COMMEMORATION

Afterfeast of the Meeting of our Lord in the Temple

The second day of the Afterfeast of the Meeting of the Lord falls on February 4.

Venerable Isidore of Pelusium

Saint Isidore of Pelusium lived during the fourth-fifth centuries. He was a native of Alexandria, and was raised among pious Christians. He was a relative of Theophilus, Archbishop of Alexandria, and of his successor, Saint Cyril (January 18). While still a youth he quit the world and withdrew to Egypt to Mount Pelusium, which became the site of his monastic efforts.

Saint Isidore's spiritual wisdom and strict asceticism, combined with his broad learning and innate knowledge of the human soul, enabled him to win the respect and love of his fellow monks in a short time. They chose him as their head and had him ordained a priest (the earliest sources for his life, however, say nothing of him being an igumen).

Following the example of Saint John Chrysostom, whom he had managed to see and hear during a trip to Constantinople, Saint Isidore devoted himself primarily to Christian preaching, that "practical wisdom" which, in his own words, is both "the foundation of the edifice and the edifice itself", while logic is "its embellishment, and contemplation its crown".

He was a teacher and a willingly provided counsel for anyone who turned to him for spiritual encouragement, whether it was a simple man, a dignitary, a bishop, the Patriarch of Alexandria, or even the emperor. He left behind about 10,000 letters, of which 2,090 have survived. A large portion of these letters reveal profound theological thought and contain morally edifying interpretations of Holy Scripture. Saint Photius (February 6) calls Isidore a model of priestly and ascetical life, and also a master of style.

Saint Isidore's love for Saint John Chrysostom resulted in his support of Saint John when he was persecuted by the empress Eudoxia and Archbishop Theophilus. After the death of Saint John, Saint Isidore persuaded Theophilus' successor Saint Cyril to inscribe the name of Saint John Chrysostom into the Church diptychs as a confessor. Through the initiative of Saint Isidore the Third Ecumenical Council was convened at Ephesus (431), at which the false teaching of Nestorius concerning the person of Jesus Christ was condemned.

Saint Isidore lived into old age and died around the year 436. The Church historian Evagrius (sixth century) writes of Saint Isidore, "his life seemed to everyone the life of an angel upon the earth." Another historian, Nikephóros Callistus (ninth century), praises Saint Isidore thus: "He was a vital and inspired pillar of monastic rules and divine vision, and as such he presented a very lofty image of most fervent example and spiritual teaching."

And cast the unprofitable servant into the outer darkness. There will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'

Fellowship of Orthodox Christians in America (FOCA) is an official organization of the Orthodox Church in America (OCA), and our Mission is to proclaim, share, and reveal our Orthodox Christian Faith through service, fellowship, and example. We strive to accomplish this by:

- Studying the beliefs of our Faith
- Supporting and encouraging Orthodox Youth Ministries
- Supporting and encouraging missionary growth of our church
- Encouraging and promoting unity among all Orthodox jurisdictions
- Establishing practical means for Orthodox Christians to engage in lasting friendships on local and national levels through networking
- Providing educational cultural, social, and athletic activities for the people of our Orthodox Faith

FOCA Motto: Pray, Study, Toil, and be Temperate

FOCA History:

Federated Russian Orthodox Clubs (FROC) was founded in 1927 as a national youth and young adult movement, with a goal to organize the faithful, produce English language church materials, and to promote the religious work of the Church. During its 90+ year history, the organization (renamed FOCA) has expanded its mission with the goal of witnessing our Orthodox Christian faith by charitable works through fellowship. Our membership is a national network of senior (adult) and junior (ages 10-18) chapters which, through a variety of religious, educational, cultural, social, and athletic activities, provides an ideal way to meet others within the faith beyond the boundaries of the local parish.

On National and District levels, FOCA sponsors a number of annual events and activities, including: Religious activities and services, Outreach and service events and fundraisers, National and District Conventions, Youth camping programs, Sports tournaments, and a Youth creative arts contest.

1920's, 1930's & 1940's

In 1927, the FROC was founded by Fr. Vladimir Prislopsky as a means to assist in the work of the Church, and to provide an ideal way to meet others within the faith beyond the boundaries of the local parish. By mid-1929 over 44 Chapters (Clubs) had been established.

1950's & 1960's

An active period in the life of the FROC as athletic competition increased at both the District and National levels. Also, the need for "Sunday School" materials and programs became a priority of the organization. In 1962, with 282 participants, the FROC sponsored the first National Church School Teacher's Conference.

1970's

On September 23, 1970 the beloved founder of the FROC, Fr. Vladimir Prislopsky, fell asleep in the Lord. Soon after, the newly constructed FROC National Headquarters in Wilkes-Barre, PA was named in his blessed memory. In 1976, the 50th Anniversary National Convention was held at the Waldorf Astoria in New York City. His Beatitude, Metropolitan Theodosius, an active FROC member and scholarship recipient, was elected Primate of the OCA in 1977.

1980's

The organization established a Mission Hotline whose purpose was to match used liturgical items, donated by established parishes, to small or mission parishes in need. A renewed interest in membership growth by youth and young adults saw increased attendance at annual FROC events, such as the National Basketball, Bowling, and Summer Sports tournaments, as well as "Junior Olympics". At the 1988 National Convention in Orlando, FL, more than 1,500 room nights were booked!

1990's

In 1994, the convention body of the FROC petitioned the Holy Synod of Bishops to be officially recognized by the Orthodox Church in America. In the spring of 1995, the Holy Synod blessed this request. At the 1999 National Convention in Albany, NY, delegates approved the organization's name change to "Fellowship of Orthodox Christians in America" (FOCA).

2000's & Today

There are currently 38 FOCA Chapters and 550 members. FOCA strengthened our relationship with St. Vladimir and St. Tikhon Seminaries, identifying new ways to help serve each of them. Since 2002, the "Adopt a Seminarian" project has provided financial assistance to needy married Seminary students and their families. From 2010-2015, FOCA pledged \$300,000 towards the Married Student Housing Project at St. Tikhon Seminary, the largest pledge in our organization's history. Additionally, Clubs donate annually to the St. Andrew's Fund and the Gifts of Love Fund; each year a different Orthodox organization is chosen to receive the FOCA donations. FOCA Clubs fundraise in various ways at their respective parishes in order to be able to monetarily donate to the above-named Funds as well as to other Orthodox recipients.
